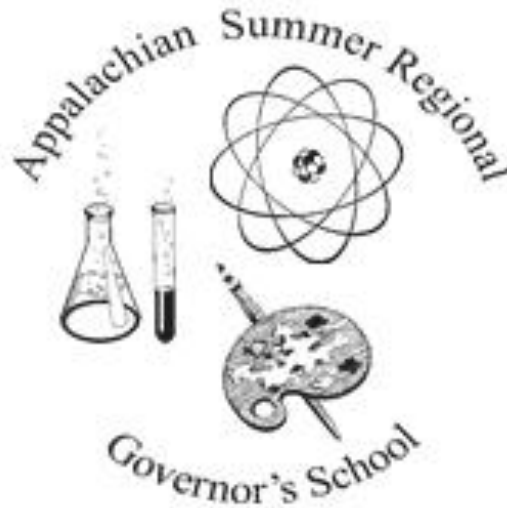

The Appalachian Governor's School is funded by the Virginia Department of Education and jointly sponsored by the School Divisions of Bland, Carroll, Galax, Grayson, Smyth, and Wythe, in conjunction with Wytheville Community College.

Applicants must hold a valid Virginia Teacher's License or have special expertise deemed necessary by the Governor's School Board of Directors (e.g., a Master's degree). Eighteen hours of graduate study in the field of expertise is preferred. A background check may be required as part of your employment.

Applicants should have:

1. A knowledge and understanding of the cognitive, social, and emotional characteristics, needs, and problems found in gifted students as a result of their atypical mental development.
2. The ability to develop a flexible, individualized enriching curriculum appropriate to meeting the individual gifted pupil needs and nurturing group interaction.
3. The ability to create an environment in which the gifted can use their strengths, explore their personal and interpersonal development, risk new areas of thought and action, and feel challenges.
4. The ability to teach the gifted learner the skills of rational thinking, integration of mind and body, self-actualization, intuitive development, and self-evaluation.
5. The ability to nurture creativity in all its aspects of thinking, feeling, intuiting, and expressing talent through products.
6. The ability to encourage in gifted learners a sense of social awareness and commitment to humanity and to their environment, and a respect for the worth and dignity of others.
7. The ability to relate well to colleagues and parents of gifted learners and to conduct professional meetings for their benefit.
